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There's something stirring in the hearts of the next generations. In a culture bent on pushing boundaries, Gen Z and their Gen Alpha siblings are quietly and courageously setting new ones—not out of fear or legalism, but out of love for a Savior who still calls His people to be holy as He is holy.

We stand at a pivotal moment in history. The great-grandparents of Gen Z and Gen Alpha once built a society

rooted in biblical values after the chaos of world war. Today, their descendants are reclaiming that legacy—not because of nostalgia, but because they recognize that only the unchanging Gospel of Jesus Christ can anchor them in a world gone mad. As we celebrate what God is doing among the young, let's not forget our charge to equip them. The torch is being passed. Will we ensure that flame burns brighter than ever?
