

# Could Fossils Across America Prove Noah's Flood? The Evidence Shocking Scientists

Could the fossil record scattered across America actually preserve evidence of the catastrophic flood described in Genesis?

That question is drawing renewed attention after a recent Daily Mail report highlighted mysterious upright fossilized tree trunks—known as “polystrate fossils”—that some researchers believe may align with the biblical account of Noah's Flood.

According to the report, these fossilized trees have been discovered in multiple parts of the United States. They are notable for their trunks extending vertically through several layers of sedimentary rock.

Researchers argue that the formations suggest the trees were buried rapidly, before they had time to decay, potentially during a catastrophic flood.

The Daily Mail report connects these discoveries to the Genesis account of Noah's Flood, in which Scripture describes waters covering the earth as a massive judgment.



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Genesis 7:19 says, “And the waters prevailed exceedingly upon the earth; and all the high hills, that were under the whole heaven, were covered.”

Researchers believe the fossilized trees may indicate rapid sedimentation caused by catastrophic flooding conditions. Some

point to volcanic eruptions, massive mudflows and sudden geological upheaval as mechanisms that could bury trees quickly enough to preserve them upright.

For Christians, the account of the Flood carries significance far beyond scientific debate alone. The Genesis narrative stands as both a warning of judgment and a testimony of God's mercy through salvation.

Jesus referred to Noah's generation when speaking about the spiritual condition of the world in the last days.

"But as the days of Noah were, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be," Jesus said in Matthew 24:37.

Just as people in Noah's day carried on with normal life while ignoring the warnings before destruction came, the modern world appears to be repeating the same pattern today. Biblical prophecy continues to be moving toward fulfillment, and humanity once again faces the urgent question of whether it will heed God's warning before it is too late.

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# Bryce Crawford Warns Satanic Influence and End-Times Deception Are Escalating Across America

Evangelist Bryce Crawford is not afraid to walk into some of the darkest spiritual environments in America.

From conversations with Satanists and members of the Ku Klux Klan to witnessing the chaos of Burning Man, Crawford says his mission is not condemnation, but bringing the gospel directly into places many Christians avoid.

During an appearance on the Shawn Ryan Show, Crawford described how his ministry intentionally enters hostile territory to engage people face-to-face with truth.

“We started this ministry because not enough people are doing it,” Crawford said. “We’re too scared of the response.”

Crawford explained that he approaches people with questions and conversation rather than aggression, believing many are spiritually hungry beneath the surface.

“If you can be so extreme for something that’s not true,” he said, referring to some of the radical groups he encounters, “how much more on fire could you be for something if you found out it was the truth?”

One of the most surprising moments in the interview came as Crawford discussed recently sitting down with televangelist Kenneth Copeland. While Crawford openly stated that he rejects

prosperity gospel theology, he said he encountered something deeply human during their private interaction.

“He looks at me and just goes, ‘I really need Jesus. Like, I need Him every day,’” Crawford said. “When I’m looking at an 89-year-old man who’s crying over the fact that no one on camera or on recording is seeing that he’s looking at me and says, ‘I need Jesus desperately every day,’ it made me have a soft spot.”

The discussion then shifted toward racial extremism and identity-based movements, including Black Hebrew Israelite ideology and the KKK. Crawford firmly rejected any theology that assigns spiritual value based on ethnicity.

“The KKK leader looked at me in the face and said Black people and Asian people are of lesser moral value than white people,” Crawford said. “That broke my heart.”

Crawford argued that the cross destroys every racial hierarchy created by man.

“The price tag that Jesus Christ put on my life was His own,” he said. “To think that someone can’t receive this unconditional love just because of their skin color or where they grew up—we need Jesus.”

Later in the interview, Crawford addressed growing fascination with the end times. While acknowledging the increasing darkness and deception in culture, he warned Christians against sensationalism and fear-based speculation about prophecy.

“We should look for signs, and we will know,” Crawford said. “But I want to be cautious at making an absolute truth claim about it, because I don’t want to lead people astray.”

Instead of panic, Crawford pointed believers toward readiness.

Using the imagery of a traditional Galilean wedding, Crawford

explained how a bride would remain dressed and prepared because she did not know when the bridegroom would return for her.

“In the same way,” Crawford said, “we want to be a bride that is ready for Christ to return.”

As cultural confusion, division and spiritual darkness continue rising across society, Crawford believes Christians cannot afford spiritual apathy.

“We need Jesus,” he said plainly. “People are tired of being fed lies.”

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## **Amanda Grace Sounds Prophetic Alarm Over America's '11th Hour'**

After clinically dying for more than 30 minutes, Randy Kay

says his encounter with Jesus forever transformed his understanding of eternity—and launched a mission to confront what he believes are misleading narratives surrounding near-death experiences.

Speaking with Sid Roth on *It's Supernatural!*, Kay recounted how a devastating medical crisis in 2005 led to what he describes as a face-to-face encounter with Christ in heaven.

Kay said he suffered pulmonary embolisms caused by blood clotting throughout his body after contracting MRSA, eventually flatlining for “30 minutes and 49 seconds.”

Despite the severity of the event—including an aneurysm—Kay said he survived without lasting brain damage.

“It was God’s doing,” Kay said. “That’s the only thing I can attribute it to is God’s healing power.”

According to Kay, the experience not only changed his life but also redirected his purpose. He says God commissioned him with a specific assignment: “Take back the narrative.”

Kay explained that many modern near-death testimonies promote universalism, reincarnation and spiritual ideas disconnected from biblical Christianity. He believes God called him to share testimonies centered on Jesus Christ and the reality of heaven and hell.

“The space has been dominated by these who testify of what is not the biblical God of Jesus Christ,” Kay said.

Years after initially keeping his own story private, Kay eventually began publicly sharing his testimony and collecting others’ accounts for his book, *Heaven Encounters: 140 Near-Death Experiences Revealing the Afterlife*. Drawing from his

background leading pharmaceutical and biotech companies, Kay said he applied rigorous validation standards to the testimonies included in the book.

Yet for Kay, the most unforgettable aspect of heaven was not scenery or grandeur—it was Jesus Himself.

“The first time I looked into His eyes, I knew consummate love, the person of love,” Kay said. “And the first thought I had was, ‘So this is love.’”

Kay described heaven as completely permeated by the love of God.

“Heaven is about the Lord God,” he said. “Without God there is no heaven.”

At one point in the interview, Kay issued a direct appeal for viewers to surrender their lives to Christ.

“He is real. Heaven is real. And yes, hell is real,” Kay said. “God doesn't want anyone to go there.”

Kay also shared how many people featured in his research—including atheists, Muslims, Hindus and Buddhists—claimed to encounter Jesus during near-death experiences.

“The greatest news the world has ever known is that Jesus came back from heaven off His throne so that He would walk toward the cross as the Lamb of God,” Kay said.

As conversations surrounding the afterlife continue to grow in popular culture, testimonies like Kay's are drawing renewed attention to eternity, salvation and the person of Jesus Christ.

These accounts serve as sobering reminders that the gospel is not merely symbolic or philosophical—it is a matter of eternal life and death. Scripture repeatedly points to Jesus as “the way, the truth and the life” (John 14:6), and Kay’s testimony ultimately echoes that same message: heaven is real, Christ is alive, and now is the time to surrender fully to Him.

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## **Taxpayer-Funded Exorcisms? Senate Erupts Over California Healthcare Program**

Sen. John Kennedy sparked controversy during a Senate hearing after sharply questioning why taxpayer dollars in California are being used to fund Native American spiritual healing practices that critics have labeled “exorcisms.”

During testimony before lawmakers, Kennedy pressed Deputy Attorney General Todd Blanche over California’s Medi-Cal program, which expanded coverage in 2024 for certain tribal traditional healing services.

The exchange quickly gained national attention as debate intensified over whether taxpayer funds should support

spiritual ceremonies and nontraditional healing practices.

According to Fox News, California's expanded Medi-Cal coverage allows federally recognized tribal healers and "natural helpers" to provide certain culturally based services through Indian Health Care Providers. The services reportedly can include spiritual counseling, ceremonies, herbal remedies and other traditional healing methods.

Fox News cited earlier reporting from The Wall Street Journal that described some of the practices as including "exorcisms," though California's official policy language broadly references tribal spiritual and cultural healing.



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The debate comes amid larger scrutiny over California's Medicaid spending.

Fox News reported that Medi-Cal spending has increased dramatically in recent years, rising from approximately \$100.7 billion in 2019 to a projected \$222 billion by 2026. The report also noted that the Trump administration recently suspended roughly \$1.4 billion in federal funding tied to California home healthcare and hospice programs amid investigations into alleged fraud.

For Christians, however, the controversy raises a deeper spiritual concern.

Spiritual practices disconnected from Jesus Christ open the door to dangerous deception. Scripture warns believers to "test the spirits to see whether they are from God" (1 John 4:1) and cautions against practices connected to sorcery, divination and spiritual mediums in Deuteronomy 18:10-12, all of which are core principles in these Native American rituals.

Ephesians 6:12 says believers wrestle "not against flesh and

blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age.” Jesus Himself cast out demons throughout His earthly ministry, demonstrating His authority over darkness and evil spirits (Luke 4:41).

That distinction is important for many Christians following this story. Biblical deliverance ministry centers on the authority of Jesus Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit—not rituals, ceremonies or spiritual traditions apart from God.

What erupted in a Senate hearing this week may ultimately point to a much larger conversation happening across the nation: what spiritual influences are currently shaping our nation, and what are we going to do about it?

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## **Sadie Robertson Huff Shares Miraculous Story About Daughter's Medical Crisis**

As believers around the world prepare to celebrate Shavuot 5786, Curt Landry and Pastor Tim Alsbaugh are calling Christians to expect nothing less than a fresh outpouring of

the Holy Spirit's power.

During a recent episode of the Curt Landry Podcast, the two leaders described this year's Shavuot celebration as a divine moment of empowerment, healing and spiritual breakthrough.

"I think this last Passover was the most powerful encounter we've ever had in 26 years of doing Passovers," Landry said. "This Shavuot, you're not going to want to miss it because I think this will God sends His fire to empower everything you've been through since Passover."

The discussion centered around the biblical meaning of Shavuot—also known as Pentecost—and its connection to both the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit in Acts 2.

Alsbaugh explained that Shavuot represents more than tradition or ritual. Instead, he said it marks the moment when God's instruction comes alive in believers through the Holy Spirit.

"They follow the instructions, they're in the upper room, and then the fire of the Holy Spirit—that same fire that wrote those instructions on tablets of stone—now here He is setting upon each and every one of those believers," Alsbaugh said. "Now that spirit is causing that word to come alive, not on tablets of stone, but now on tablets of their heart."

Landry also emphasized the progression of the biblical feasts, describing Passover as deliverance, Shavuot as empowerment and Tabernacles as abiding in God's presence.

"You deliver, you're empowered, and you abide," Landry said. "We're coming up on the power."

Throughout the conversation, both men pointed to growing chaos in the world as evidence that believers need spiritual boldness now more than ever.

“If the world ever needed a representation of what the kingdom of heaven really looked like, it’s today,” Alsbaugh said. “This is a season that the Lord is going to empower His people with that Holy Spirit to literally turn the earth upside down.”

Landry used a vivid illustration from a recent home repair project to explain the supernatural power available through the Holy Spirit. Comparing a machine that effortlessly removed hardened glue from a floor to the gifts of the Spirit, he said that many Christians are trying to operate by human effort rather than divine empowerment.

“Why are you as a Christian trying to scrape the glue off your floor when you can just sit there and [receive the power of the Holy Spirit]?” Landry said. “I’m expecting a power transfer tomorrow night at House of David.”

The two leaders also connected current world events, Bible prophecy and revival expectations to this year’s Shavuot observance, encouraging believers not to focus on fear but on what God is speaking in this hour.

“What’s going on with God? What’s He saying? What’s He speaking?” Alsbaugh said. “If you’ll tune in to what He’s what happens is it doesn’t make any difference what goes on anywhere else. You’re in alignment with Him.”

As anticipation builds for Shavuot 5786, Landry and Alsbaugh believe Christians are stepping into more than another church service. They say this is a moment for Christians to be filled afresh with the fire of God, empowered for the days ahead and awakened to the reality that the Holy Spirit still moves with miraculous power today.
