

9 Prophetic Warnings From the 1800s That Are Unfolding Now

A global system is tightening its grip on buying, selling and control. Scripture already warned it would come. The question is not if it arrives, but whether believers recognize the difference between that system and God's.

In a recent interview with Rebecca Lamb Weiss, Kap Chatfield delivered a direct challenge to how Christians view money, provision and power, pointing to a growing dependence on systems that compete with God's design.

God's Economy vs. Babylon's System

"What the devil wants to do in Christians is he wants us to come out of agreement with the Word," Chatfield said. "What we're subtly doing is we're putting our trust in Pharaoh and King Nebuchadnezzar and the Babylonian economy and an antichrist agenda."

Revelation describes a system where participation in the economy requires submission. Chatfield pointed to Deuteronomy, where God commands His Word to govern both thought and action.

"What is the Antichrist trying to do? It's a mockery of an allegiance to an economic covenant," he said.

This is not about money. It is about allegiance.

A Different Source of Provision

"We operate from a different economy," Chatfield said. "My king owns the cattle on a thousand hills. He is El Shadai, the all-sufficient one. He is Jehovah Jireh. He is my provider and my prosper."

Economic instability loses its grip when provision is rooted in covenant.

“It doesn’t matter what’s going on in the economy,” he said.

What Prosperity Really Means

“God would allow you to abound and be all sufficient in all things and have an abundance left over for every occasion of generosity,” Chatfield said, referencing 2 Corinthians 9.

Prosperity is not excess for self. It is provision for purpose. It is having what is needed to fulfill God’s assignment and more than enough to bless others.

Scripture shows this pattern again and again. God provides and that provision fuels purpose.

The Heart Follows the Treasure

“Wherever my money is sent is where my heart will follow,” Chatfield said.

Giving aligns the heart with the kingdom. Without it, alignment never fully happens.

Breaking the Cycle of Lack

“God’s people are destroyed for a lack of knowledge,” Chatfield said.

Misunderstanding keeps believers stuck, limits the Church’s impact and silences teaching on biblical stewardship. When truth is restored, provision grows and the mission moves forward.

“You never have a fixed income with God,” he said.

Built to Build, Not Beg

“Christians were made not to beg but to build,” Weiss said.

Giving is not about meeting a need. It is about what is added to the giver’s account and how the kingdom advances.

A Call to Realignment

Old mindsets must be laid down. Traditions that contradict Scripture must go. God’s Word must take final authority.

The choice is clear. Trust the system of Babylon or align with the economy of heaven.

One leads to control. The other leads to freedom.

And in a world moving toward total economic control, that choice carries weight now more than ever.

Is This the Most Important Prophecy in the Bible? Pastor Jack Hibbs Says It Proves God Exists

As space exploration surges back into focus with the launch of the Artemis II crew and their moon mission, questions about faith and science are rising with it. But Christian astrophysicist Hugh Ross says the deeper we go, the clearer the Bible becomes.

“He made us curious. I mean, we’re unique amongst all life on planet Earth in that we’re curious about everything,” Ross said to conservative commentator Glenn Beck. “I think God gave us a curiosity for a reason. He really does want us to explore.”

That curiosity, he explained, does not compete with faith. It strengthens it.

Does God Want Us Exploring Space?

As debate grows over missions to the moon and beyond, Ross pushed back on the idea that space exploration is a waste or an act of pride.

“We want to know what’s beyond the universe,” he said, pointing to humanity’s unique desire to explore what no other creation even considers.

Rather than a rebellion against God, Ross framed exploration as something rooted in design. The drive to discover is not accidental. It is intentional.



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A Different Look at Noah's Flood

Ross tackled one of Scripture's most debated events head-on. "The Bible tells us that the flood lasted 375 days," he said. "There had to be a lot of melting ice and snow for the flood to last that long."

He pointed to massive ice age melt events and said the flood wiped out all humanity at the time without covering the entire globe. "It also puts the flood early enough in human history that the flood can wipe out the entire world of humanity."

He also reframed the purpose behind it. "Humanity was literally in danger of self-extermination," Ross said. "At least nine out of 10 people died as a result of being murdered."

Genesis and Modern Science Align

Ross said the most striking detail is not just accuracy, but order. "It's not just that the descriptions are correct, everything is in the correct chronological sequence."

He pointed to scientific discoveries that now mirror Genesis, including atmospheric changes tied to oxygen levels. "When the oxygen hit 8% the atmosphere... cleared you could see through it."

He added that Scripture described key features of the universe long before modern astronomy. "The universe has a beginning... expands... and gets progressively colder."

The Sign That Matters Most

While many look to the skies for answers, Ross pointed to a different sign. “Jesus told His disciples that He would return the moment that His followers take the Good News... to all the people groups of the world.”

The mission is within reach. “We have the wealth, the technology and the people... All we lack is the motivation.”

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Public Repentance

He admitted his past was driven by attention and profit.

“I didn’t care who I hurt. I just cared about the views, the attention, the money,” he said.

Now, he says his focus has shifted.

“What matters is today. How I behave today, how I behave tomorrow,” he said. “God gave me a new lease on life... to truly be better and do better.”

From Crisis to Conversion

This moment builds on his earlier revelation after a life-threatening hospitalization with severe sepsis, where he said God revealed Himself to him and changed his life.

Raised Catholic but not previously committed in faith, Hilton described that experience as the turning point that led to his current spiritual journey.

A Call to Prayer

“My heart is filled with gratitude and love and repentance,” Hilton said.

As this story continues to unfold, let us pray that this transformation remains real, that repentance takes deep root and that his walk with the Lord produces lasting fruit.

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‘No Known Parallel’: Ancient Christian Artifact Discovered Near Sea of Galilee Stuns Experts

A stunning archaeological discovery near the Sea of Galilee is shedding new light on the earliest practices of the Christian faith, revealing a depth of tradition that has remained hidden for centuries.

Archaeologists working in the ancient city of Hippos have uncovered a rare artifact that could reshape understanding of early baptism rituals, as reported by Fox News.

The 1,400-year-old object was found inside a ceremonial baptism hall known as a photisterion, a place where new believers entered into one of Christianity's most sacred acts. Officials described the discovery as "a rectangular block bearing three hemispheric cavities, found beside a baptismal font in a newly revealed ceremonial hall."

Researchers believe the unique design points to a deeper layer of early Christian worship. The three cavities may have held oils used in a threefold baptismal process, a structure that stands apart from what is typically known. Early Christian baptisms more commonly involved two anointings, making this artifact especially significant.

"After extensive examination and comparison, the scholars concluded that no known parallels to the artifact exist," officials said.



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The artifact was preserved when the structure collapsed during an earthquake in 749 A.D., protecting it beneath rubble for more than a millennium.

Today, it stands as a powerful witness to the devotion and detail that marked early Christian communities in a region closely tied to the ministry of Jesus.

Archaeologist Michael Eisenberg said the significance of the find was not immediately clear. "The object was 'nothing special at first glance,'" he said to Fox News. "But here is exactly where the archaeological and liturgical studies came into play."

“Realizing that it is a one-of-a-kind artifact that may fill unknown regional and perhaps wider lacunae in one of the most ancient and sacred Christian ceremonies was a complete surprise,” Eisenberg added.

He noted that the discovery may “open a portal” into how baptism rituals developed across different regions of the early church. “In different regions, distinct liturgical traditions developed, many of which are not documented in written sources,” he said. “This find offers a rare glimpse into how the baptismal rite was shaped and practiced in the Byzantine Christian community of Hippos.”

This discovery does more than fill historical gaps. It points back to the enduring power of baptism as a public declaration of faith, a practice rooted not only in Scripture but in a living tradition that has carried through generations.

As new pieces of the past come into focus, they remind us that the foundations of our faith were laid with intentionality, reverence and unwavering devotion to Christ.
