

Jordan Peterson Emotional over Olivia Wilde's Attack on 'Marginalized Group'

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As the world promotes promiscuity, sex before marriage, abortion and drunkenness, the effects are continuing to be seen across culture. Not only are celebrities and those who influence the young generations today promoting a lifestyle void of any true purpose they bash on those who work hard to help young people today find their true identity.

Director and actress Olivia Wilde spoke out about her new movie "Don't Worry Darling" which she bases an insane character off Jordan Peterson who she says is a "pseudo-intellectual hero to the incel community." First Peter 2:11-12 says, "Dearly beloved, I implore you as aliens and refugees, abstain from fleshly lusts, which wage war against the soul. Live your lives honorably among the Gentiles, so that though they speak against you as evildoers, they shall see your good works and thereby glorify God in the day of visitation."

It appears in all aspects that Peterson is encouraging men around the world to live honorable lives that are filled with good works which not many influencers in today's society are doing. Christians should pray that amid the backlash he has faced, that the world would see the good works and search for a greater purpose found in Jesus.

In the interview with Morgan, Peterson says "It's really something to see, constantly, how many people are dying for lack of an encouraging word." As Christ followers, we are called to encourage and build up one another in our faith.
