Mailchimp Swats at 'The Babylon Bee,' Gets Stung

Babylon Bee CEO Seth Dillon tweeted out a picture of an email he received on Thursday, June 24, from the e-newsletter marketing service Mailchimp.

The posted picture of the Mailchimp notice claims that The Babylon Bee has been suspended for violating "our Standard Terms of Use and Acceptable Use Policy". The message did not provide a specific incident for the online publication's suspension or an explanation as to what triggered the removal, but simply a generic link to its policy, which states:

Mailchimp does not allow the distribution of content that is, in our sole discretion, materially false, inaccurate, or misleading in a way that could deceive or confuse others about important events, topics, or circumstances.

If you violate any of these rules, then we may issue a warning to, suspend, or terminate your account.
