Georgia Follows Suit, Introduces Bill Similar to Florida's 'Parental Rights' Legislation

Georgia state senators introduced legislation Tuesday similar to the recently passed bill in Florida banning classroom instruction on "sexual orientation or gender identity" from pre-K through third grade.

The Georgia proposal, S.B. 613, centers on keeping discussions on issues like sexual orientation and gender identity out of instructional materials for primary grades across the state.

"No private or nonpublic school or program to which this chapter applies shall promote, compel, or encourage classroom discussion of sexual orientation or gender identity in primary grade levels or in a manner that is not appropriate for the age and developmental stage of the student," reads the legislative proposal. {eo}

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
