Contemporary Christian singer Amy Grant, a Nashville native, stayed close to her roots in advance of traveling to New York City, where she will be recognized for a lifetime of achievement and become the first contemporary Christian music star to receive the Kennedy Center Honors Award on Sunday, Dec. 4.

It seemed nothing short of a miracle that Grant, 62, was able to headline a free Christmas concert at Lipscomb University in Nashville for the 18th year in a row. Due to some loss of memory and a shoulder injury that required surgery following a bicycle injury in a Nashville park, she had to cancel all her fall concert dates.

Vaccinated People Are Majority of COVID Deaths

The latest data from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) reveals that people who have had the COVID shots made up most of the COVID deaths in Aug. 2022.

Of the total 6,512 Coronavirus deaths recorded in August, 58.6% of the deaths were attributed to vaccinated or boosted individuals. In addition, there is a growing trend where vaccinated individuals are increasingly becoming the majority in COVID mortalities.

Approximately three in 10 adult Coronavirus fatalities in the fall of 2021 were vaccinated or boosted. But by Jan. 2022, approximately four in 10 COVID deaths were vaccinated or boosted. By April 2022, the CDC data showed that about six in 10 adult COVID deaths were vaccinated or boosted. {eoa}

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
