

Rare Egyptian Archaeological Find Reveals Mysterious Temple Linked to Ancient Rituals

The temple is believed to have been dedicated to the deity “Pelusius,” which “is described as a ‘shadowy figure’ in ancient mythology...”

Dating back roughly 2,000 years to the late Ptolemaic or early Roman period, the temple appears to have been used for an extended time before eventually falling into disuse.
