“I want to ask you this because I say this at conventions a lot, this rumor that I heard, and I want to know if it’s true,” the interviewer starts off. “There’s a rumor that production was called by real witches of New Orleans saying ‘you’re playing with fire and you’ve got to change up your chants.’”

"Then we got a call from a woman in New Orleans who was like, 'I think that you're playing with fire...what are you trying to do? You're putting these spells in everybody's living room all across America,'" she continued.
